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INTRODUCTION

In our waking lives we are flooded with manipulated information. We constantly strive to become ever more sophisticated in our engagement with this deluge, in order to stay afloat in a sea of lies and half-truths. But at a time in which authenticity has become a currency to be traded in, manipulation of existing media can sometimes reveal hidden truths.

Notions of manipulation and authenticity run throughout this year's programme, from the revisionist mash-ups of star guests Soda_Jerk, to the play between ethnography and fiction in the work of Colombian filmmaker Laura Huertas Millán; from the films emerging from the margins of the Paris banlieues to the inclusivity of First Reels, a Scottish short film scheme that cast its net wide to find and nurture a new Scottish cinema.

We welcome Shalimar Preuss, presenting her delicate narratives that draw magical realism from mundane reality, and Tara Razavi, whose videos for Tyler, the Creator and SZA have seared extraordinary images onto our eyeballs. We dive into the world of VR with *UnRealities*. And Glasgow's UNESCO City of Music artist-in-residence Richy Carey invites us to manipulate our voices to contribute to the live scoring of *Accents*, a new work exploring individual and collective identity.

Huge thanks to Glasgow Film for keeping us buoyant, to our funders Creative Scotland and to our sponsors, particularly Blazing Griffin, ibis and Merchant City Brewing. We couldn't do this without the indefatigable CCA, and we're thrilled to be back in festival hub Civic House this year.

SODA_JERK

Formed in Sydney in 2002, Soda_Jerk is a two-person art collective working at the intersection of documentary and speculative fiction. They are fundamentally interested in the politics of images: how they circulate, whom they benefit, and how they can be undone, through sampling, re-editing, superimposition and humour. We are delighted to welcome Soda_Jerk to Glasgow with their latest film TERROR NULLIUS and an ongoing multi-channel work Astro Black.





OPENING FILM: TERROR NULLIUS

Wednesday 13 March (20.30) GFT // 1h30m // N/C 18+

At once satire, eco-horror and road movie, this political revenge fable offers an unwriting of Australian national mythologies. Soda_Jerk's revisionist history opens a wilful narrative space where cinema fictions and historical facts permeate each other in new ways. The apocalyptic desert camps of *Mad Max 2* become the site of refugee detention, flesh-eating sheep are recast as anti-colonial insurgents and a feminist motorcycle gang goes vigilante on Mel Gibson. The short film version of a triple grindhouse bill mashed up into one all-nighter mega trip, a miraculous creation that keeps slipping in and out of the cracks between set genres – Christoffer Olofsson, Uppsala Short Film Festival

INSTALLATION: ASTRO BLACK

Thursday 14 - Sunday 17 March (11.00-19.00) CCA Intermedia Gallery // Free entry

Titled in tribute to Sun Ra's 1972 album, *Astro Black* is an ongoing multi-channel video cycle with the cosmic jazz artist as its central figure. Comprised entirely of samples from film and music sources, Soda_Jerk's work spins an alternate history of political resistance and music, via Afrofuturism, avant-garde jazz, German electronic music and hip-hop, stacked with pop cultural imagery from Star Trek to David Bowie.

POINTS ON A SPACE AGE

Saturday 16 March (21.30) Civic House // 1h30m // N/C 15+

Cosmic jazz musician Sun Ra's influence seeps further into GSFF19: To accompany Soda_Jerk's Astro Black, we're screening Points On A Space Age, the 2007 free-form Arkestra documentary by artist-filmmaker Ephraim Asili, alongside As Told To G/D Thyself, the brand new Kamasi Washington short, directed by The Ummah Chroma (Bradford Young, Terence Nance, Jenn Nkiru, Marc Thomas and Washington himself), which just premiered at Sundance and features music from his latest record Heaven and Earth.



THE GREEN FOG

Saturday 16 March (21.30)

CCA Theatre // 1h15m // N/C 15+

Using footage repurposed from hundreds of films and TV shows shot or set in San Francisco, directors Guy Maddin (*My Winnipeg, The Saddest Music in the World*) and Evan and Galen Johnson have fashioned an extraordinary parallel-universe remake of Hitchcock's *Vertigo*. Stripped of their dialogue, actors as diverse as Humphrey Bogart, Joan Crawford, Sharon Stone and Chuck Norris stand in for James Stewart and Kim Novak, stuttering their way through scenes that are both comic and moving, giving a jarring impression of déjà-vu. With a haunting soundtrack performed by the Kronos Quartet, this borrowing from other sources is paradoxically quite unlike any other cinematic experience. *Absolutely electrifying. You leave with your brain on fire.* – Bilge Ebiri, The Village Voice

BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 2: EDGELANDS

Thursday 14 March (20.45) GFT Cinema 3 Saturday 16 March (15.30) CCA Theatre 1h45m // N/C 15+

Stories from the periphery, of grifters, the disenfranchised and those seeking an alternative way of living. A rental van is the setting for three very different stories of interference in others' lives. A suddenly homeless Greek woman tries to hold down her job. In Finland, people stalk motorway verges looking for roadkill to eat. An Iranian farmer stops at nothing to retrieve his stolen cow. A typhoon threatens a small town in the Philippines, whilst a loner in the woods waits for the apocalypse.



BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 1: Four Walls

Housing is a fundamental human right. In this programme that right is variously denied, challenged or undermined. A woman on parole finds herself barred from her highrise home, earmarked for demolition. A trawl of Italian archives reveals the troubled story of housing in Rome. A Palestinian exile, nominally safe in his Berlin home, worries about the implications of a mild act of protest. A drab suburb becomes a place of threat when a girl goes missing. And a Mumbai family is terrorised by an ill-advised pet rooster.



BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 3: MOM & POP

The harder we love our children, the further we drive them away. The protagonists of this programme variously struggle with the expectations and assumptions that accompany parental love. Some are grappling with the absence of that love, whether through cruelty, depression or geographical separation, or with substitute parents and the space for misinterpretation. Others are attempting to escape a parent's embrace in order to live their best life. This programme is for anyone who's been a parent, or had one.



BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 4: SOMETHING MORE THAN FREE

Liberation is never straightforward. The personal is always political, and sexual freedom comes at a cost. The sacred cow Ingmar Bergman is taken to task for his entitled philandering, whilst burgeoning queer identity is played out in the context of the repressive nationalist politics of 1990s Pakistan. A woman meets the lover who allures and repels her, whilst economic necessity leads Portuguese straight boys to test the limits of their sexual flexibility.



BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 5: POSSIBLE WORLDS

Ghosts of past traumas live amongst us. Some learn to accept their presence. Others attempt to suppress them by reshaping the landscape and rewriting history. But we forget our past at the peril of seeing it replayed under the guise of progress. This programme takes us from the site of a Colombian massacre to the grandiose civic project of Skopje 2014 and to an African-American farming community in North Carolina, before launching us into a Hieronymus Bosch-influenced vision of heaven and hell.



BILL DOUGLAS AWARD 6: C:\LOSE YOURSELF

Increasingly we live our fullest lives online, pursuing life-or-death thrills vicariously through gaming or YouTube videos. But inevitably the separation between the virtual and the real has become less distinct. Virtual worlds can be harnessed in positive ways, to examine the real through fresh eyes, but they can also blind us. Drifting between documentary and fiction, this increasingly vertiginous programme considers the convergence of the world we choose and the world we can never leave behind.

FIRST REELS RETROSPECTIVE



First Reels (1991-1999) was the first of the short film production schemes introduced by the Scottish Film Council (later Scottish Screen), in partnership with Scottish Television. It was launched with the aim of giving aspiring filmmakers the means to embark on - or complete - their first project. Whilst giving talents such as David Mackenzie and Peter Mullan their first break, the scheme was remarkable for its inclusivity. A diverse range of applicants were given small grants and the freedom to experiment in all genres and forms of filmmaking, STV produced three half hour broadcast documentaries each year, showcasing the work to a wide public. GSFF is delighted to bring some of the 130+ films produced through the scheme back to the big screen, most of them for the first time in over twenty years.



FIRST REELS 1: DREAMERS

Saturday 16 March (15.15)

GFT Cinema 2 // 1h45m // N/C 15+

In the very auditorium where many of these films were first projected, this programme presents a Scottish cinema that is quite unlike the social realism that has dominated short film production in the last two decades. Sadomasochism, dreams of a distant home and sexual fantasy are touched on in films by Ewan Morrison, Travis Reeves and others. We end with David Mackenzie's epic Edinburgh-set film noir Dirty Diamonds.

FIRST REELS 2: SCOTTISH WOMEN FILMMAKERS IN THE 1990s

Saturday 16 March (19.30) CCA Theatre // 1h45m // N/C 15+

At least a third of the films produced through First Reels were directed by women, whether fiction, documentary, animation, artists' moving image or community projects. Some have continued to work in the industry whilst others have moved away from filmmaking altogether. This programme draws together some of the lesser known and more experimental works, addressing subjects as diverse as Malcolm X, superstition, breasts, west of Scotland identities and the first Scottish suffragette.

FIRST REELS 3: SENSE OF PLACE

Given the freedom to fail, the First Reels filmmakers produced surprising, often lyrical work, with a strong grasp of geographic and social setting. Peter Mullan's *Close* brings a blackly comic Grand-Guignol horror to the story of a paranoid new father driven over the edge. Chris Dooks and Alex Norris' *Beacons* is a UK-wide travelogue, meditating on light and mortality, whilst David Cairns transports a Robert Louis Stevenson story to contemporary Edinburgh. Others explore superstition in Scotland's fishing communities or capture the thrill of joyriding on the streets of Glasgow.

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RECLAIM THE NAME

Thursday 14 March (18.30)

CCA Cinema // 2h // N/C 12+

The victim, the oppressed, the one without a voice. That's not us. We're taking the power back, reclaiming and defining what it means to be Muslim women.

Curated by Amina MWRC and Scottish filmmaker Raisah Ahmed, this is a strand of films from around the world that showcase the voices and talents of female Muslim filmmakers. Focusing on a range of themes, genres and approaches, this programme does away with pigeonholing and lifts stereotypes through honesty, humour and bravery. The screening will be followed by a performance of spoken word poetry and a discussion on the themes of the films and how we overturn false and dated narratives.



THE ETHNOFICTIONS OF LAURA HUERTAS MILLÁN

Thursday 14 March (21.00) CCA Cinema // 1h45m // N/C 15+

We welcome Colombian filmmaker Laura Huertas Millán, screening three works that combine multiple modes of storytelling to explore the spaces where documentary, anthropology and fiction intertwine. A triptych of rich and poignant portraits—all produced by Millán during a practice-based PhD between Beaux-Arts de Paris and Harvard Sensory Ethnography Lab—deftly move between the real and the imagined; melodrama and memoir; staged performance and interview to challenge the colonial roots of ethnography, examining complex ideas around representation, womanhood, and individual and collective freedoms.

ANTI-ETHNOGRAPHY

For indigenous peoples the camera is a dangerous weapon. Anthropology's obsession with preserving images of 'vanishing' indigenous cultures through ethnographic films has long been a tool used to colonise and oppress indigenous peoples. The anthropologist's encapsulating gaze ignores the fact that for indigenous communities tradition is not an immutable set of truths handed down by revelation, but a set of ever-evolving social practices whose continuity cannot be repaired by preservation, only elaborated through struggle, and finally achieved under conditions of genuine self-determination. This selection of video works examines the violence inherent in the ethnographic impulse, and unveils the absurd fetishism underpinning the discipline.

BRAZIL: LUTO PARA NÓS É VERBO

Brazil has become the apocalyptic vanguard that signals how radical this moment is. So wrote Brazilian journalist Eliane Brum a week after the far-right Jair Bolsonaro settled into the country's highest office, in a period of turmoil and danger for anyone standing in the way of his ultra-conservative following. With the help of our friends at MOSCA, Mostra Audiovisual de Cambuquira, we have compiled a programme of recent Brazilian short films that give voice to those currently under constant threat, both the country's minority communities and the guardians of its natural resources – the lungs of the world. Brazil's future is our future.



NOUS LES SAUVAGES: VOICES FROM THE BANLIEUES

They are young and talented. Funny and imaginative. Often their skin isn't white. Often their parents or grandparents were born outside the borders of metropolitan France. They grew up on the outskirts of Paris or some other big city: in *la banlieue*, this wide part of the urban territory, mostly despised, poorly portrayed when not forgotten by a mainstream media that remains willfully blind and deaf to its vibrant energies. They are artists, filmmakers, actors... Slam the door in their face; they will come back through the window, movies in their pockets.

We present a new work of film/music by Glasgow's UNESCO City of Music artist-in-residence Richy Carey.

A live performance event at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, *Accents* brings together communities to sing a live soundtrack to a film exploring the sounds of identity and place. Using the film itself as the score, *Accents* is about the everyday music in our voices, asking questions around how we listen and speak with each other, the sound between our individual and collective identities.

OPEN WORKSHOP (11.00)

Glasgow Royal Concert Hall, New Auditorium // 2h

Join in with members of the city's community choirs as composer Richy Carey leads a workshop exploring ways of improvising sounds for film with our voices. Thinking about how we relate to the place we live in and to each other, learn how to sing his new film/scores before taking part in the premiere at 13:00. Everyone is welcome, no need to be a singer, just a willingness to join in!

ACCENTS: INFLUENCES

Prior to the premiere of his new film/scores Accents, composer Richy Carey presents a programme of artist films that speak to some of the themes in the work. Variously exploring ideas of place, voice and identity, collective performance, indeterminacy and instruction scores, as well as the relationship between image, sound and text, the programme includes works by Kathryn Elkin, Beatrice Gibson, Mikhail Karikis, Peter Rose and John Smith.

SHALIMAR PREUSS

Shalimar Preuss took the Bill Douglas Award at GSFF18 for her elegant and mysterious film *Strange Says the Angel.* The jury described it as 'both supremely self-assured and spontaneous, reflecting the inquisitiveness of a young girl and the expressiveness of a woman artist'. This work is the latest of several shorts and a feature in which Preuss has developed a magical realist style, working with non-actors to create worlds that are rooted in the quotidian yet suggestive of dreams and legends. We are delighted to welcome Shalimar to Glasgow to present a selection of her films.

TWO WEIRDS IS TOO WEIRD: THE JACKAL FILMS OF ALICE LOWE & JACQUELINE WRIGHT

Before Alice Lowe wrote, directed and starred in *Prevenge*, the triple-threat-to-be teamed with director Jacqueline Wright on a series of strange and hilarious shorts. With feline erotica, courtly necrophilia and aspiring mermaids, under their Jackal Films banner the two struck a path for themselves through a restrictive culture.


